

Historical House in Roxborough/Manayunk



327 Green Lane, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19128, USA

Isaac Wilde, the first owner, acquired this land in 1888, but there was a previous house on it. He demolished that and built this new one—completed in 1892.

There have been seven ownerships up through 2014, but many more than owners have resided in the house (including children). It is associated with area structures, as owners had positions of leadership in them. Wilde himself was an owner of an impressive Manayunk mill (cf. p 5), was Vice President of a trolley company that came from the lower falls of Wissahickon Creek (at Ridge Ave) to within one city-block of his house (cf. pp 4-5 and the artistic representation to the right), and also served the area as a City of



Philadelphia Councilman. The Belmont/Green Lane Exit of the Schuylkill Expressway actually connects with this house (cf. p 4), as does the impressive bank structure at Ridge & Green Lane (cf. p 3). To flesh out all this with images will take pages. The approach here is to start with present owners and travel back in time to the original owners. Since Paul & Prudence Humber have been the owners spanning more years than any other and also are current, we could call 327 Green Lane the “Humber House”.



#7) The Humbers moved into the house on March 20, 1981 (33+ years ago), with twin children, Paul and Ruth (age 7 at the time). Paul’s parents, Charles and Evelyn, moved in 8 months later (Nov 1981). Son Peter arrived in 1985. Prudence, a registered nurse with a degree in nursing from UPenn, formerly taught at Abington Memorial Hospital’s School of

Nursing. She instructed many couples in childbirth classes in the Roxborough area even before moving in. One of her students was actually a former resident of 327 Green Lane (see below). For 23 years, she was Director of Alpha Pregnancy Services, a pro-life ministry in Center City.

Husband Paul taught upper school mathematics in Haverford School's Wilson Hall for 24 years, is the author of several books, has served as pastor, and is currently Director of CR Ministries, Philadelphia. He met his wife at UPenn and has two degrees from there himself.

#6) The couple who sold the house to the Humbers were the McCafferys (Edward & Gertrude). They lived in the house 18 years and had seven children (3 boys and 4 girls). On June 28, 2014, the youngest son, Mike, spoke for awhile with the present owner. He remembered taking childbirth classes from Nurse



The 3 windows above and (slightly to the left) of the front doors mark Paul's classroom for many years.

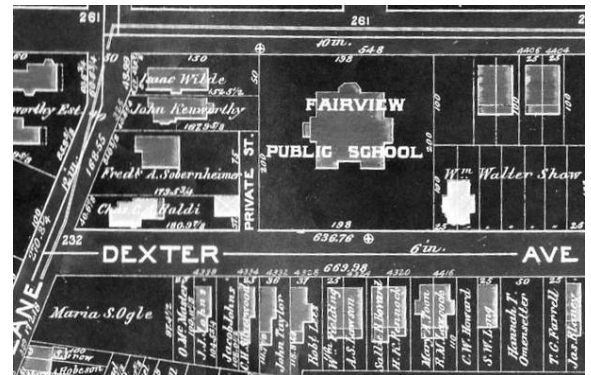


Prudence (see above). His dad was both a detective & caterer. Apparently, the father left this unusable (rusted) 38 revolver on the basement floor, along with many other things in the house—including a miniature 1976 license

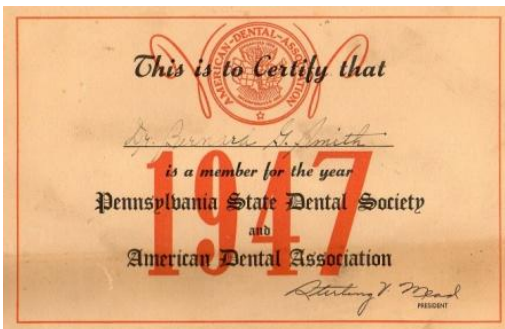


tag behind a 1st floor mantel (cf. left).

The family lived in the house when the Cook School was burned and eventually was replaced by a free city parking lot. One can see the school in the image



to the left—before the fire. In 1892, the school was called Fairview Public School. This name is retained today in the park adjacent to the lot, Fairview Park. One can also see the house's garage in the same image. The two-car (brick) garage was built in 1937 and is still very serviceable.



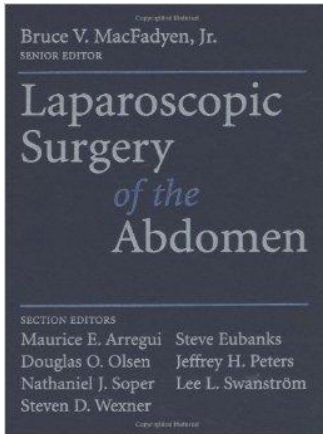
#5) The fifth owners (two removed from the current) were Dr. & Mrs. Bernard Smith (1944—1963). He was a dentist and had his dental chair in the room where this "historian" now writes. It is a lovely room with 6 windows—4 facing the alley & 2 spruce trees (15' tall)—and two others. One of them faces the front (and the other, the back) yard. Dr. Smith graduated in 1911 from the Medico-Chirurgical College of Philadelphia, and according to the *Bulletin of the Medico-Chirurgical College of*



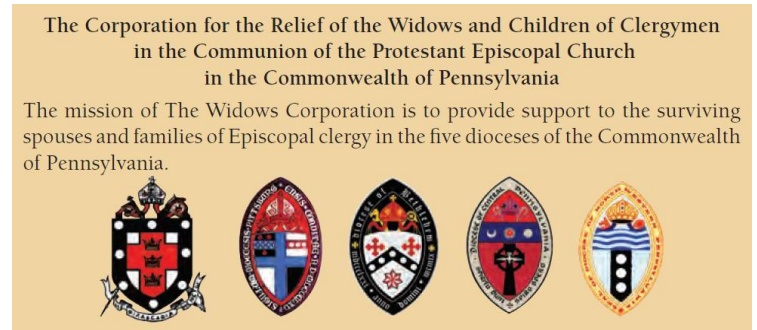
Philadelphia, Volume 7, Issue 3 (March 1912), he was Vice-President of the Dental Alumni Association. Two dental certificates of his were found

behind the den mantel (one is displayed on p2). The image of a dog was also found behind the mantel. Since the year was 1951, perhaps this was a mid-century canine resident belonging to the Smiths.

#4) The fourth owner was actually a church corporation (1935-1944). Notice the years. In Philadelphia, there were about 30 bank closures during the Great Depression, and the female heir of the #3 owners transferred the property to this “Corporation.” →



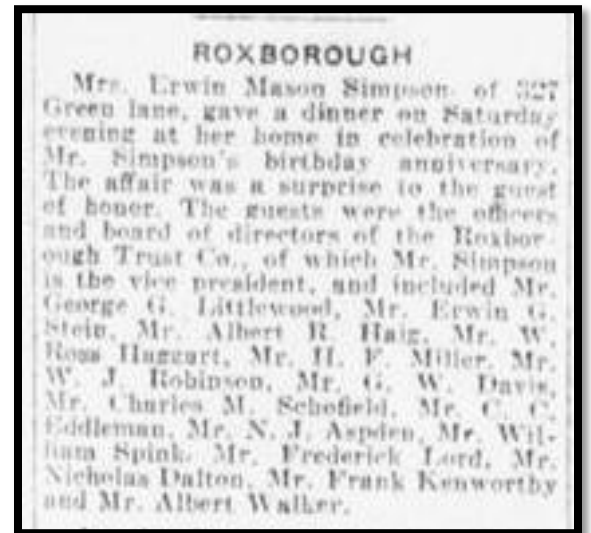
During this period, Bruce MacFadyen, M.D., rented the house (1940—1943). According to the UPenn Gazette, “Dr. Bruce V. MacFadyen GM’32, West Chester, Pa., a retired obstetrician-gynecologist; July 1, 2001. His son is Dr. Bruce V. MacFadyen Jr. GM’56.” Both of these men lived at 327 Green Lane in the early 40’s, the latter subsequently being a Haverford School graduate, where the current owner taught for 24 years. “Dr. Bruce MacFadyen [Senior Editor of the book to left] was past President of the Christian Medical & Dental Associations (CMDA).” At least until recently, he held the position of Chairman and Professor of Surgery at the Medical College of Georgia.



#3) The #3 owners (4 removed from the present) were Mr. & Mrs. Erwin Mason Simpson. The somewhat faded newspaper clipping to the right is from Philadelphia’s *Evening Public Ledger* (Dec 16, 1919, p 11). It says, “Mrs. Erwin Mason Simpson of 327



Green lane, gave a dinner” to celebrate her husband’s birthday.



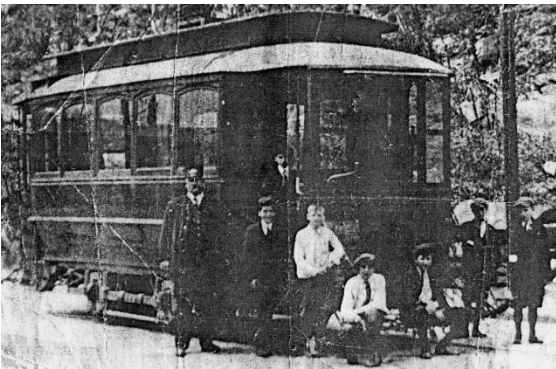
“The guests were the officers and board of directors of the Roxborough Trust Co., of which Mr. Simpson is the vice president.” The names of 15 men are listed in addition to Mr. Simpson’s. For 1919, the Pennsylvania Bankers' Association listed the address as being Ridge Ave and Green Ln (3 blocks from the house—see image to the left). Not only is the clipping faded, but even the once thriving bank probably suffered during the Depression. It is good

to remind ourselves that newspapers and banks fade. The Maker said, “Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys, and where thieves do not break in or steal; for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.”

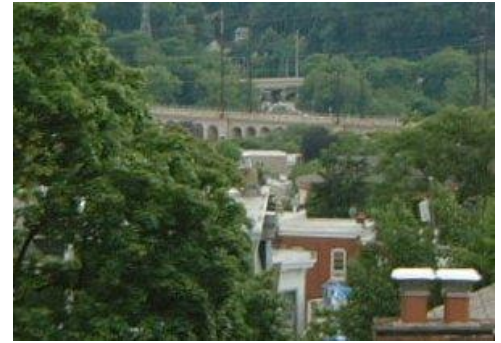
#2) Peter Paul Liebert and his wife, Anna, became the #2 owners of 327 Green Ln. In his *Will*, he spoke of “my house situate at the Southwest corner of Green Lane and Manayunk Avenue.” The year he



signed his *Will* was 1914, and he died in 1915. His signature from the *Will* is to the lower-right (p3). His son, PPL “Jr” (groom in the 1915 photo) would have been about 14 in 1906 when his parents purchased the home from owner #1. The #2 owner was President of the Wissahickon Electric Railway Co. The newspaper clipping (below) shows one of the trolleys in 1916 (on Leverington Ave—about 5 blocks from the house). He was also the President of Glen Willow Ice Manufacturing Co (images below, to the right).



From the roof of 327 Green Lane → one can see the famous Manayunk Bridge and still more distant the Schuylkill Expressway (near the Green Ln/Belmont Av exit). At that place, one can see



in a 1939 image (on the 5 white silos) the words “Glen Willow Ice MFG. Co.” On page 103 of the 1893 *Philadelphia Securities: The Standard Statistical Manual of the Corporations of the City of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania* by Crittenden, Helffrich, and Page, one can read that the “Glen Willow Ice Manufacturing Co. ...[had] “Peter P. Liebert” listed as President and “Isaac Wilde” listed as one of the “DIRECTORS” (see below). This

above the silos and a smaller one in front). Ice does fail, however, but the Maker of water, ice, and humans never fails.

Liebert was also a director of St. Timothy's Hospital (now Roxborough Memorial Hosp—see lower-left), and was Founder (beginning in 1872), of Liebert & Obert Brewery (see to the right). A small

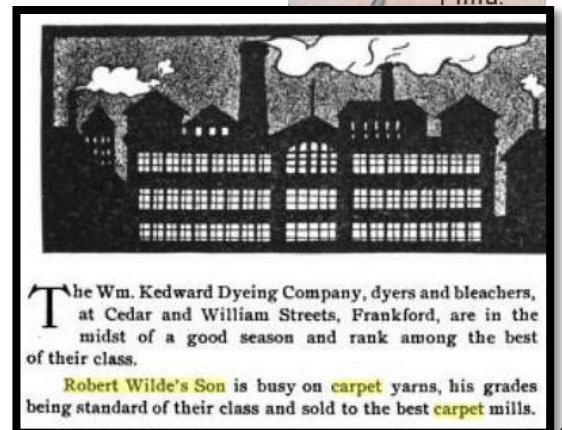


picture of the brewery is found on the previous page (to the right of PPL Jr's wedding picture).

#1) Isaac Wilde (with Emma, his wife) was the first

same Isaac Wilde was the first owner of 327; Peter Liebert, the second. In the image above (right side) there are two signs that say, “ICE NEVER FAILS” (one

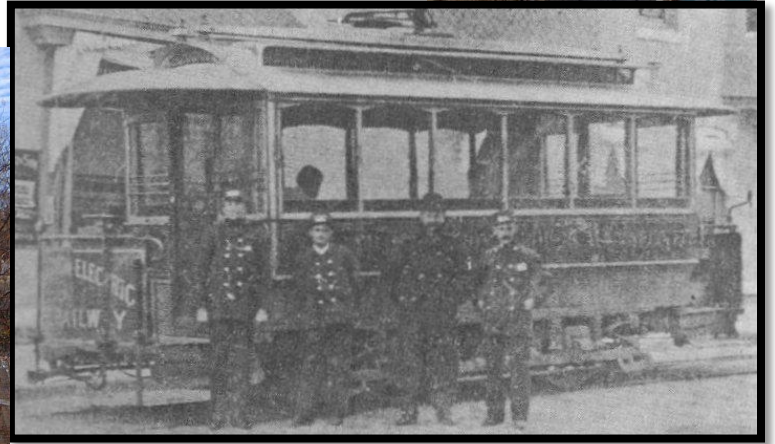
owner of the property. He was also a manufacturer of carpet yarns. In *The American Carpet and Upholstery Journal* (Volume 23, April 10, 1905, pp 61 & 100) one can see "Robert Wilde's Son" (see lower right image, previous page). This "Son" is Isaac Wilde. The building exists today (see below).

Isaac's parents came from England, and for a time the mill was called Robert Wilde's Sons. In 1895, three years after the house was built, his brother died, and Isaac became the owner of the mill. Thus, in the ad, we see "Son" in the singular (previous page).

The Wildes had 3 daughters, Jessie, Mabel, and Myrta. Wife Emma died in 1904, only living in the house a dozen years. Isaac died in 1909.

A street in Manayunk is named after the Wilde family. In fact, the mill is located at the intersection where the old mill still stands (at Wilde Street and Leverington Avenue).

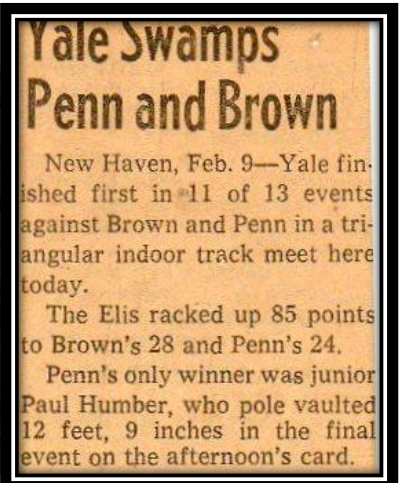
Both Isaac Wilde and Peter Liebert were involved with the trolley enterprise, one serving as president; the other, as VP. There are bus routes today (#'s 27 & 35) which approximate the paths used by the trolley lines. The artistic representation on page 1 is based on this clipping from 1894 (see below to the right). This was taken two years after Isaac Wilde moved into the house.



The "mill" to the left no longer functions as a mill *per se*, but it does house another business (Trent).

Kaleidoscopic Historical Connections

Many people have heard of famed runner, Jesse Owens. He won four gold medals at the 1936 Berlin Olympics and exploded the myth of Aryan supremacy. Not only has current owner Paul Humber denounced Hitler's survival-of-the-fittest nonsense in various publications, but he himself is distantly related to one of the Olympians in the Jesse Owens' 4X100 relay. The man on the extreme left is Bruce Humber; the man second from the right is Jesse Owens. Bruce had the



same great...great grandfather as Paul Humber, #7 owner. John Humber, who had sons, was Paul's great, great, great grandfather from son David Hess Humber. Bruce descended from David's brother. #7 owner was also a trackman at UPenn (cf. previous page).

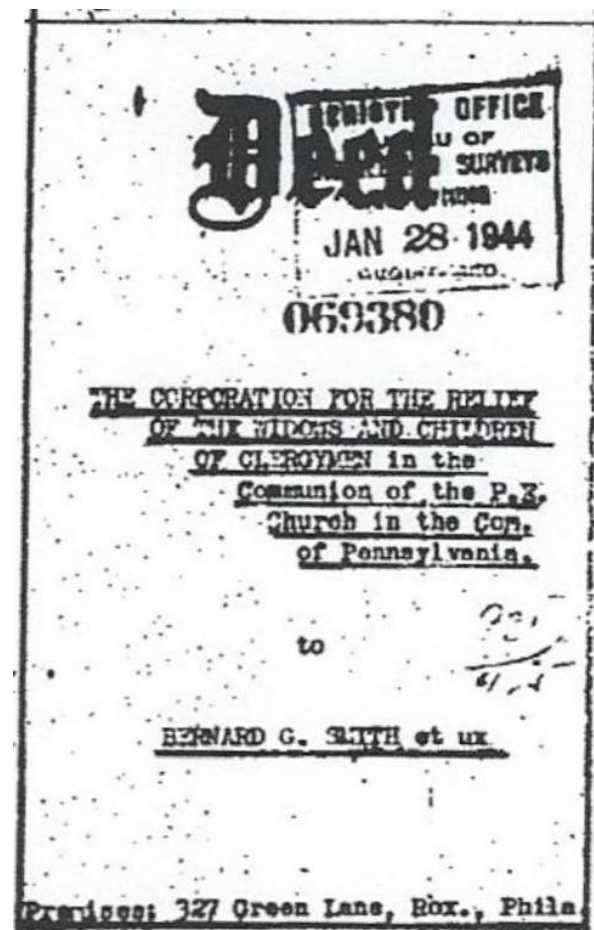
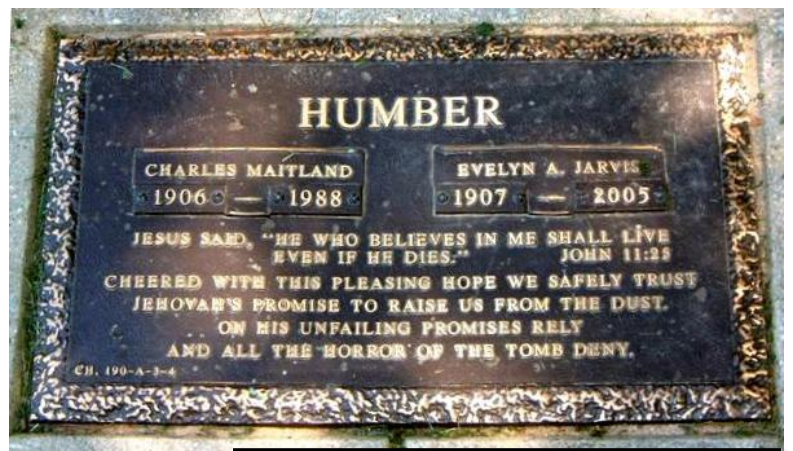
The tombstones for Isaac and Emma Wilde are about 5 blocks away from the house, near the intersection of Ridge and Lyceum. See image below. They can even be seen while sitting inside Bob's Diner!



While on the subject of gravestones, Dr. and Mrs. Charles M. Humber, parents of Paul (#7 owner), lived in the house spanning 24 years, arguably the second longest span. Their grave plaque (see below) is a testimony to their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

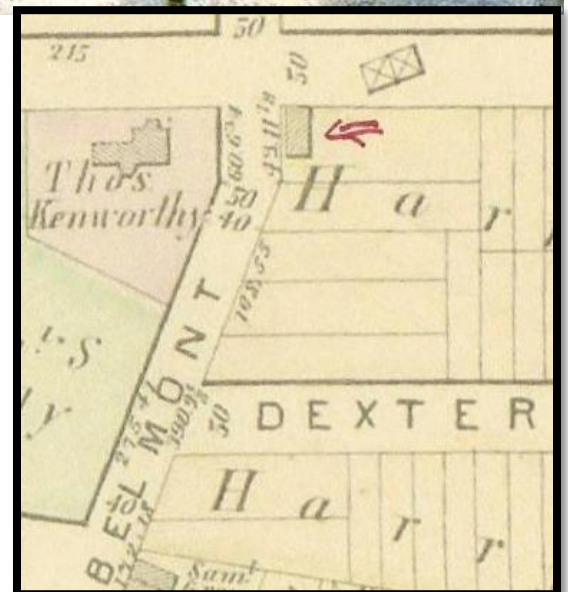
One advantage of this section is to offer supporting documentation not

supplied above. For example, someone might question whether the Corporation of the Protestant Episcopal Church ever owned the



house. We do not publish the entire deed, but to the left is a part of it.

Here is something new, not shared above. According to an 1875 map, Green Lane used to be called Belmont Ave! Dexter Street is still the same, and, on the large map, Manayunk Ave was still the



same. Notice also that the house depicted on the property then (red arrow) is very different from the present house. Its address was 4402 Manayunk Ave. Also, there are no other houses on the south side of "Belmont" between Manayunk Ave and Dexter. This image gives some clue as to the shape of the former house. There is also another map dating to 1863, but that one essentially gives a dot for the former house.

As stated above, current owner Paul Humber taught mathematics at The Haverford School for 24

from page 1 of the Nov 10th, 1909 issue of the *Manayunk Sentinel*. The first owner was an “energetic and influential (Philadelphia) Councilman.”

To the right, is an image of the Glen Willow company (see p4 above) in 1931. One can see an officer (perhaps on a telephone) and also the “Ice Never Fails” sign on the tower.

In the next picture (p 9), one can see the silos, the beginning of the railroad



DEATH REMOVES WELL-KNOWN MAN MR. ISAAC WILDE

Once Prominent Manufacturer and a Most Energetic and Influential Councilman.

Isaac Wilde, retired manufacturer and a former energetic and very efficient Councilman, died Monday of general debility. He was born in Covington, Ky., December 28, 1841, and was a son of Robert and Mary A. Wilde, who had emigrated from Oldham, England.

In 1873 he joined his father as partner in a large mill, after the father's death Isaac and his brother Thomas continuing the business under the firm name of Robert Wilde's Sons.

Mr. Wilde is survived by three daughters: Mrs. George Littlewood, Mabel and Myrtle Wilde.

Since Isaac Wilde was the first owner of 327, it is fun to speculate that a picture of him may actually exist—in this 1894 image. There seem to be 6 people in the faint image, but only one is → sitting—in the center. Could it be Isaac Wilde two years after he purchased 327? It is found in the *Transit Journal* (Vol 10, Oct 1894, pp 642-3).

Other historical perspectives relate to things close to 327 Green Lane, such as the Green Lane Bridge. This 1924 image (below) shows the old bridge—with



Manayunk to the right. 327 was up the long Green Lane ascent.

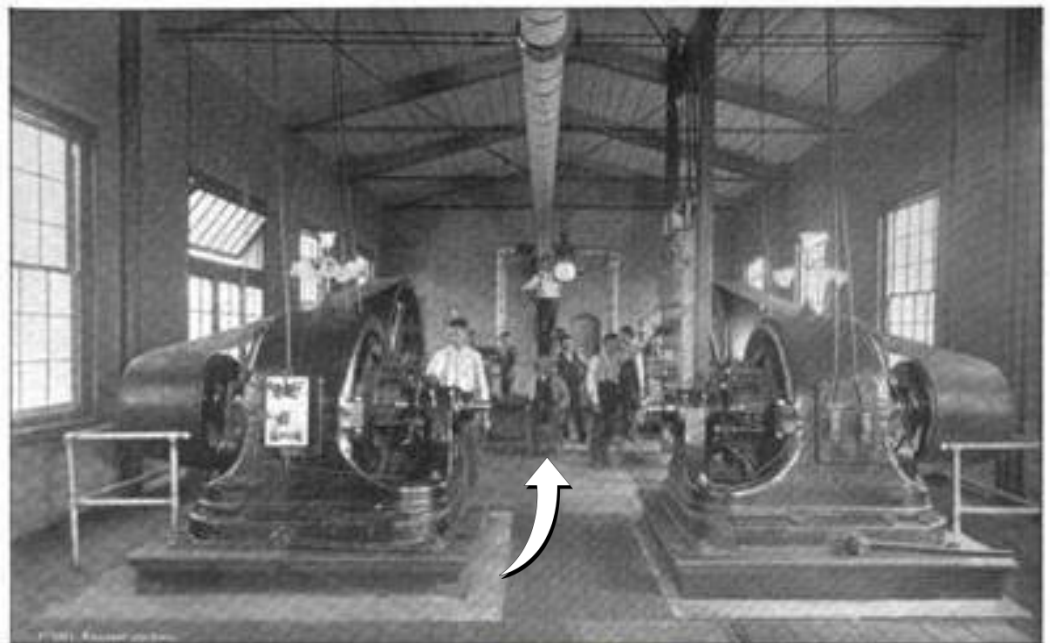



FIG. 2.—RAILWAY PLANT—STATION OF WISSAHICKON ELECTRIC PASSENGER RAILWAY CO.



Every person pictured in this 1990 image has been an overnight guest of 327. You can see the address, "327 Green Lane", on the porch post—upper right. In the second row (left to right) are twins Paul and Ruth, Prudence, Anna (who did the trolley art on page 1)), Paul's mother, Evelyn, and Paul (Sr). Peter is on the lap of his maternal grandfather, "Beep", with his maternal grandmother, and Jim, Anna's husband.

In the spring of 2014, the owners contracted Home Town Insulation LLC to remove asbestos from all basement heating pipes. The job was done, and Criterion Laboratories Inc sent a letter on April 30, 2014 indicating that "All samples met the City of Philadelphia-

mandated re-occupancy standard (following asbestos abatement projects) of 0.01 fibers per cubic centimeter of air (f/cc). The Certificate of Analysis is attached." (See below.)





Prudence Humber took this picture of the myrtle tree in bloom near the end of July, 2014. Her hubby is in the foreground. He is standing in the parking lot, which used to be part of the Cook School property → (illustrated above). Beyond the myrtle tree stands the 1937 serviceable,



two-car garage. To the left is the larger magnolia tree, one of the larger ones in the neighborhood. There are several other lovely trees on the

property, including blue spruce, red oak, Japanese maple, tall pine, threadleaf maple, oxheart cherry, weeping cherry, and even a young redbud tree in a sidewalk plot (in memory of Gram String). There are azaleas and many seasonal flowers planted by Prudence. The sidewalk seen is along Manayunk Ave facing toward Green Lane. Below and to the right is fall foliage in front of the house (on Green Lane) with Prudence.



← During winter months, a newly installed mantel with stainless steel liner and wood stove serves to heat the 1st floor den, and warmth ascends up the stairs to the floors above.
